### Tool Bars

On the bottom of the page is a tool bar.

The first icon is the legend for the map.

The second icon is named "Layers". Layers can be ticked on and off, some will not load until you zoom closer to a location. The layers in the mapping system are:

- Apiary Sites
- Apiary Site buffers
- DBCA Offices
- DBCA Managed Tenure
- Annual Indicative burn plan
- Unallocated Crown Land
- Pastoral Leases
- Determined Outcomes – Native Title
- DBCA Districts
- Local Government Authorities
- Public Drinking Water Protection Zones
- DBCA Interest Tenure

The third icon is for printing maps.

The fourth icon is base maps, you can try selecting the different base maps. They are:

Dark grey canvas, Imagery, Imagery with labels, Light grey canvas, National Geographic, Oceans, Street Maps, Streets, Terrain with labels, and Topographic.

There is a search bar on the top left of the map. You can use this to search for National Parks, or for a set of coordinates.

There is a search tool on the top right hand side of the map, you can search for apiary site numbers using this tool.

There is a measuring tool on the top right of the map. When you select the second ruler icon and then click on the map, it allows you to measure distances.

Coordinates can be found on the bottom left hand side of the screen. When hovering the mouse over the map the coordinates will align with the pointer.

### Legend

Sites marked green are current.

Sites that are pink are pending in a beekeeper name.

Orange sites are vacant

Crosses are denied sites.

Red sites are not to be re-issued.

## **Filter**

You can filter by the status of a site.

## **Separation Distances**

An apiary site will not be approved if it is within **3 kilometres** of another beekeeper's apiary site. There is no minimum separation distance for apiary sites held by the same beekeeper. In the layers list there is an apiary site buffer, when this is on they will show up as circles around each apiary site. New sites will not be approved if they are inside these apiary site buffers.

Apiary sites issued prior to 31 January 2012 were approved with a separation distance of 2.7 kilometres between apiary sites. In the case that one of these sites is relocated, the new site location will require the minimum 3 kilometre separation distance from other beekeeper apiary sites.

An apiary site will not be approved if it is located within **200 metres** of walk and bike trails or an Aboriginal cultural site.

An apiary site will not be approved if it is located within **500 metres** of public locations including but not limited to: recreation sites, campgrounds, picnic areas, tourist attractions.
